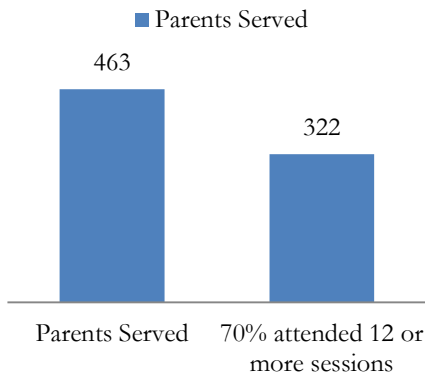


Incredible Years Basic Parent 2013-2014 Outcomes Summary

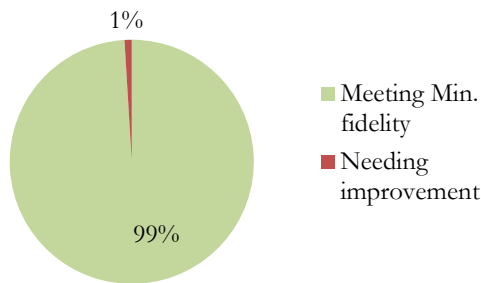


Population Characteristics: The Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency provided funds to support **seven Incredible Years Providers** in 2013-2014. The program was implemented in twelve counties; Adams, Allegheny, Bedford, Cumberland, Dauphin, Delaware, Fulton, Lackawanna, Lancaster, Somerset, Washington, and Westmoreland.

Targeted Risk and Protective Factors:

- Poor Family Management
- Family Conflict
- Family History of Antisocial Behavior Family Attachment
- Family Opportunities for Prosocial Involvement
- Family Rewards for Prosocial Involvement

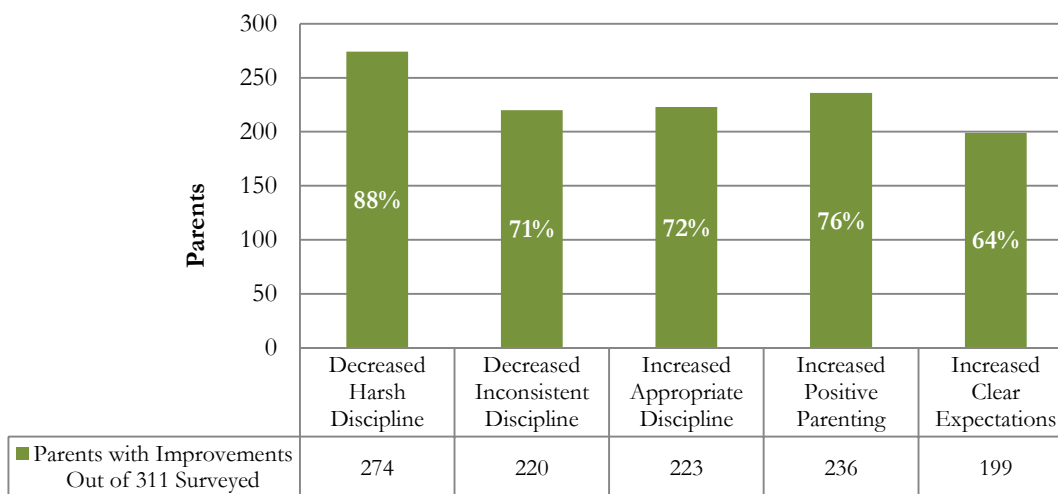

Incredible Years Basic Parent Outcomes

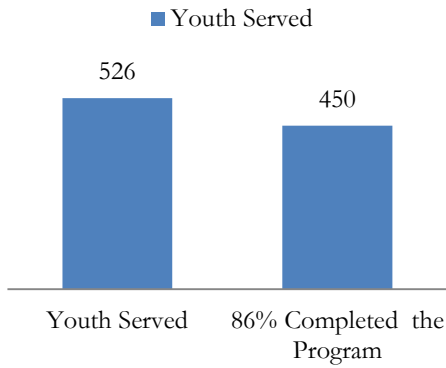


IYS Surveys: IYS Basic surveys are completed by parents during the first and last sessions of the program.

Total Number of Parents Completing Pre and Post: 311 Parents out of 463 served, or 67 percent completed pre/post measures.

Incredible Years Dinosaur School 2013-2014 Outcomes Summary



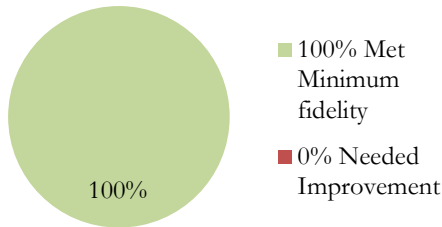
Population Characteristics: The Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency provided funds to support one Incredible Years Dina Classroom Provider in 2013-2014. This universal prevention program was implemented in schools in three counties; Bedford, Fulton, and Somerset.

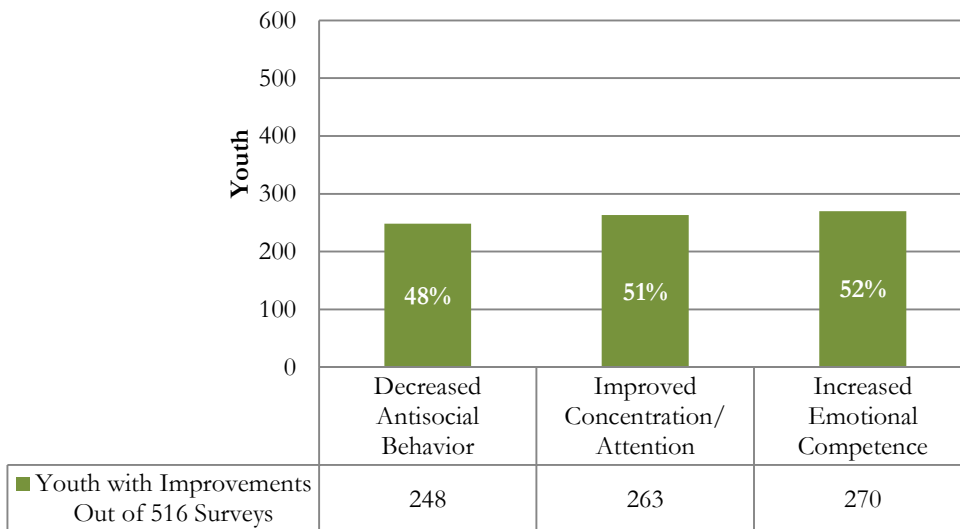

Incredible Years Dinosaur School Outcomes for 516 Youth Assessed



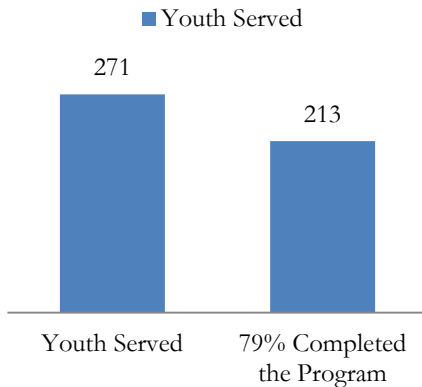
IYS Surveys: IYS Dinosaur School surveys were completed by facilitators during the first and last sessions of the program.

Total Number of Youth With Complete Pre and Post: 516 youth out of 526 served, or 98 percent had pre/post measures completed by their teacher.

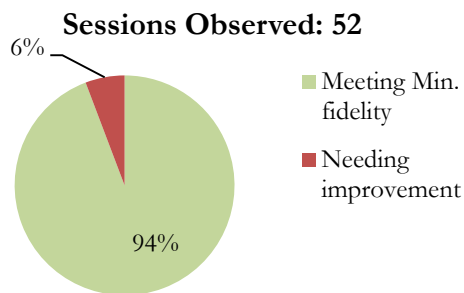

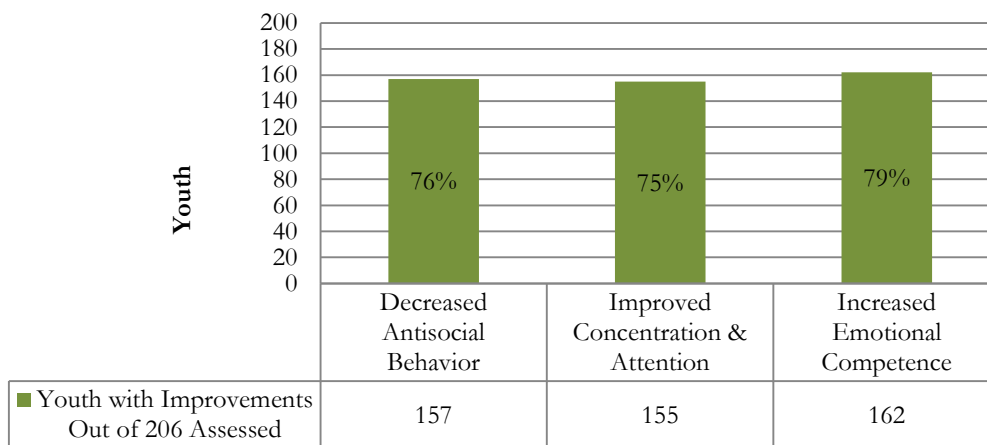

IYS Small Group Outcomes



IYS Surveys: IYS Small group surveys are completed by teachers or parents before the first and after the last sessions of the program.

Total Number of Youth With Complete Pre and Post: 206 youth out of 271 served, or 76 percent had pre/post measures completed by the small group facilitator or a parent.
